(Editor's Note: This tour was announced and scheduled for visits to wineries between Des Moines and Olympia. However, because some of the wineries will not be open during the winter, the hosts went in a different direction for this year's tour. Read on for details!)

The club has attended the north sound Wine and Chocolate Tour for several years. The tour over the years has been reduced down to seven participating wineries. So after input from members of our club we have located a Valentine Wine and Chocolate celebration in Woodinville.

In the past, one fee was charged and tasters could sample at each of the seven wineries. However, this year, tasting fees will be collected at most of the wineries on the tour, so this will be different than in the past. Some will have snacks to sample with the wines and dark, white, and milk chocolate will be served by the hosts for those who want to taste with chocolate.

The address for the starting point is 19501, 144th Ave. NE. Thirteen wineries or tasting rooms are located within a five minute walk of each other, but you will want to pace yourself so you will be able to remain responsible at the end of the day. More than one-half of the wineries have offered a discount and a private tasting room for our group. There is ample parking which will allow us to park as a group. If you are a member of the organization, Seattle Uncorked (free to join) you may be able to save on some tasting fees. Find out more at www.seattleuncorked.com.

For those of you interested, we will start the day off with breakfast at 'The Barking Frog' in the Willows Lodge 14580 NE 145th Woodinville, Wa. at 10 a.m. The Barking Frog is a casual bistro featuring country fresh Northwest cuisine and has received the 2003 Restaurant of the Year award by the Washington Wine Commission. Breakfast menu items range in price from \$8-\$12 per person.

We will hand out information on the wineries at 11:30 in the wineries' parking lot. After a hard day of wine tasting, club members should have ample time to take their valentine out for a romantic dinner.

We have made dinner reservations at the Santa Fe Mexican Grill 12709 NE 129th Woodinville. Please RSVP a week in advance for breakfast and the wine tasting so we may negotiate a greater price discount based on the number of members attending the Wine Tasting event.

Were you around when. . .

(Editor's Note: Throughout 2009, the Sounder will publish tidbits of news from our archived newsletters. Look for this column in each issue of the Sounder in 2009. Thanks to Keith Newsom, who read in the January 2009 Sounder that our archives were incomplete, and graciously copied the missing issues. The club now has a complete set of archived Sounders).

From the 1991 issues:

--River Rafting Trip, which included an overnight to Leavenworth in early June, a day of rafting for \$55 per person, which included all equipment and lunch, plus a choice of camping or a hotel stay. Sounds like fun! Anyone remember that trip?

--The annual "Spring Shop Session" was held at a Bellevue home and featured tools and wax, plus popcorn, pretzels, and drinks to keep things going.

--The Sounder noted that 17,500 people had joined the Miata Club of America as of May 1! Growth was anticipated at a rate of about 1,000 per month.

--The club joined the Mount Hood (OR) chapter for a combined drive to Mt. St. Helens that included a loop drive with a picnic lunch at the Spirit Lake Viewpoint. Trivia question from the tour: "What is the name of the national forest where Mt. St. Helens is located?" (See the end of this column for the answer).

--What was once just the "Puget Sound Chapter Newsletter" became the "Miata Sounder" starting with the October, 1991 issue. It has remained so ever since.

A few additional memories from 1992:

--A "Hidden Vistas" rallye in October, 1992 featured a 2+ hour trip through the streets of the Seattle area, promising "vistas you didn't know existed" and fun prizes for those with a sharp eye for details. Twenty Miatas attended the event.

--At the annual showing of the LeMay car collection, 20 Miatas registered and spent the day with Harold and Nancy LeMay, who drove around the grounds in a '34 Ford Roadster "that shames the one in the Smithsonian."

--by October 1992, membership had reached 146!

--The Third Year Anniversary celebration of the PSMC was an afternoon event at Chateau Ste. Michelle, Washington's oldest winery. Cost was \$30 per person.

Reflection from February, 1993:

--In February, the club decided to incorporate some charitable organizations into the club activities. The first was to sponsor donations for the First Place School for Homeless Youngsters, with donations to be brought to the *Sweetheart Desert (sic) Social*. The "Best Design" dessert winner was Glanda Allen, who made a DieHard Battery cake, featuring Reese's peanut butter cup terminals. The best-tasting dessert, however, was made by Lynne Stuller, who made kahlua-dipped chocolate chip cookies layered in Cool Whip. Can you say "sugar coma!"

Why do you belong to PSMC?

Results of the survey conducted by the PSMC board in December reveal that most of those who responded joined the club so they could make new friends with similar interests. A large number also joined because they wanted to go on both local and out-of-town drives.

The response to the survey was underwhelming: only a little more than 10 percent of the total membership responded. While difficult to draw any conclusions, board members wanted to share some general tendencies revealed in the survey.

A dues increase, which is an oft-considered agenda item at board meetings, seems to be an idea whose time has come. The increase would help defray costs for insurance, which enables the club to host events. Innovative ideas for fundraisers to support club activities showed that many would like to have the club seek sponsorships from local car dealers. This would help the club fund its insurance and the printing costs for the membership directory. Some also favored charging a nominal fee (such as \$5 to \$8 per car) for each event, with half going to the event host and half to the club to help defray club costs. Other ideas met with a lukewarm response, including hosting a detailing day for the public.

Sometimes event organizers wonder why people don't attend events. Those who responded had two main responses: the

starting point or the date is inconvenient. This may indicate that there may be more club activity in one area of the Puget Sound than the other. Others believe the main board-sponsored events should be more centrally located. With members stretching from roughly Olympia to Moses Lake, and Port Angeles to Mt. Vernon, a definition of "centrally located" might be a new topic for discussion.

The board always hopes for big numbers at board-sponsored events, but that does not always happen. Responses to improve the events, such as Detailin' Day, the Gathering, and the annual Holiday Party, varied. Many would like personal phone call invitations from the board while some believe more advertising of events would encourage better attendance. Others say food should be the prime consideration to improve at these events.

Board members are working on one suggestion that arose from the survey. Many of those who responded said they would consider hosting an event but did not know how to go about the planning of it.

With an active and up-to-date website already in place, some suggestions for how to plan events may be uploaded on the web soon, giving everyone one less excuse to host or attend a great event with the PSMC.

A lot of good blue roads dot the landscape between Puget Sound and the Pacific Ocean. There's also a great old mansion to stay in, and good food if you know where to find it.

We have some good roads in mind for the Clockwise to the Coast Tour. We will make our final selection on the route based on what's passable after Ma Nature and the highway crews get done, so details are sketchy right now.

What we do know is that we will begin our tour at 11 a.m. with lunch in Lacey, at Cebu, a fantastic Filipino restaurant run by Angel & Kim Vano. Check www.ceuwa.com for their menu and map. (Their escabeche is fabulous!). Lunch menu items run around \$10 per meal. The driver's meeting will follow lunch, around noon, in the parking lot at Cebu, and the drive will begin after that.


From Cebu we will head south and west, roughly speaking, on some of our favorite roads, ending up in the South Bend area. We'll eat dinner at a good place that offers seafood. (We have two recommendations so far.)

We'll stay the night in South Bend, at the Russell House Bed and Breakfast built in 1891. It has seven guest rooms with various attributes. Five rooms hold two persons, and two rooms are singles. Some rooms have private baths and some share baths down the hall. It's all explained on their website (www.russellhousebb.com). We're getting a 15 percent discount from their low-season rates. We've blocked out the whole place for Saturday night, so we'll let you choose your own accommodations. Give Beverley, the nice innkeeper with a delightful accent, a call at 1-888-484-6907.

Russell House has an organ and a guitar for guest use, so if you have a modest-sized musical instrument, bring it along for some fun evening entertainment at the end of the first day's drive. In South Bend we'll also take time to check out the beautiful Pacific County Courthouse.

After a fantastic breakfast at Russell House, we'll head on clockwise through the cranberry bogs to Aberdeen and Hoquiam, where we'll visit the Elton Bennett museum in the old postoffice. Eventually the folks who need to get home can head east on the "Aberdeen freeway" to US 101 and I-5. Those with more time can enjoy some more blue roads between Aberdeen and Olympia.

2009 Autocross Preview

It's 2009, and autocrossers are ready to go! 2009 is chock-full of events. The first few events will be in Bremerton. The Slush events will be held Feb. 8 and 22, and March 8. These events often (but not always) require WWSCC membership. Since PSMC is a member of WWSCC, that means you are, too! Just bring your membership card with you to registration. Pre-registration is highly recommended: it's free, and with some events it's required.

The first NOVICE SCHOOL of the year will be on March 1 in Bremerton. If you're interested, keep a close eye on <http://www.bscc.net/> for registration information. This school (run by BSCC) fills up very quickly. BSCC's first event of the year will be March 15. The last two weekends of March will be the first West Coast SCCA National Tour and Pro Solo of the year. March 21-22 will be the San Diego National Tour; March 28-29 will be the El Toro ProSolo. Scuttlebutt has it that a PSMC member or two may be at one or both of these events.

April starts off with another NOVICE SCHOOL, on the 4th in Bremerton. This school, also quite popular, is run by the NW Region SCCA, so keep an eye on <http://www.nwr-scca.org/solo/> or <http://www.wwscc.org/> for details. The day after the school will be NWR-SCCA's first event of the season, also at Bremerton. April 18 and 19 will be an SCCA ProSolo in Alameda, CA. However, if you don't want to drive that far to autocross, BSCC will be holding their second event of the year on April 19 in Bremerton. Closing out April will be an NWR-SCCA Core Workers Practice on April 25th in Packwood (by invitation only), followed by their second event of the year on April 26th (also in Packwood).

May 2-3 will be an SCCA ProSolo in Lincoln, NE. This will be the first look at the home of the 2009 SCCA National Championships for many competitors, so expect some high numbers (unless there's an entry cap, of course). May 16 will be the NWR-SCCA's for ProSolo of the year, followed by

NWR-SCCA #3 on the 17th. Both events will be in Packwood. The next weekend is also full: Sunday, May 24th will be NWR-SCCA #4, followed by BSCC #3 on Monday the 25th (both in Bremerton).

June will be deceptively calmer, but it will really be the calm before the storm (otherwise known as "July"). June 14 will be BSCC #4 in Bremerton. Saturday, June 20 will be NWR-SCCA ProSolo #2, followed by NWR-SCCA #5 on Sunday. Both events will be in Packwood.

Here comes July, so grab your sunscreen and hold on to your hats (helmets)! First up will be NWR-SCCA #6 on the 5th in Bremerton. July 11-12 will be the largest event of the year: the SCCA National Tour in Packwood. This event attracts drivers from all over the and Canada. It is known for it's high level of competition, and it's wild 'n' crazy banquet at the Packwood Firehouse. Some competitors will return home on the 12th, but some won't. After resting on Monday, the next three days will be the Evolution Schools (<http://www.evoschool.com/>). These schools are for all levels of driving. Although there won't be any racing on Friday the 17th, it will be plenty busy with competitors checking in for the next event: the SCCA Packwood ProSolo. Held on the 18th and 19th, the event will have fewer drivers than the National Tour, but will contain even more adrenaline. In ProSolos, drivers will face off against other drivers. That's right, two drivers will be on course at the same time. If you want to autocross in the western part of the state, BSCC will be holding their 5th event on the year on the 19th in Bremerton.

August 1-2 will be the SCCA National Tour/Western States Championship in Vail, CO. I have the feeling that a PSMC member or two may be attending this event. The following weekend will be BSCC #6, held on August 9 in Bremerton. August 15 will be an NWR-SCCA OPEN PRACTICE, followed by NWR-SCCA #7. Both events will be held in Packwood.

The autocross season will come to a climax in September, with the SCCA ProSolo Finale on September 5-6 and the SCCA Solo National Championships on the 8th-11th. Both events will be in Lincoln, NE for the first time. Those staying closer to home can autocross on September 7 in Bremerton, at BSCC #7.

October will bring the 2009 season to a close. October 4 will be NWR-SCCA #8, October 10 will be a BSCC NOVICE SCHOOL, and October 11 will be BSCC #8. All of these events will be held in Bremerton.
